The greens and grounds will be maintained and developed in conformance with applicable environmental, health and safety standards.

Unwavering dedication to our mission and our principles is the best assurance that our objectives will be attained. The extent to which we are successful will be ultimately determined by our members.

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## DCPC Golf Course Policy Regulating Architectural Changes

DCPC is historically and architecturally a significant golf course and change should not be taken lightly. Therefore, architectural changes to the golf course are mapped out in a master plan which must be approved by the green and grounds committee and the board of governors. The master plan should be developed to restore DCPC to its original Seth Raynor design or in the spirit of Raynor and his tried and true replications of famous holes. This includes bunker construction and removal, tree planting and removal, tee construction, green construction, outbuilding construction, and landscaping. Cart paths and placement should also be included, but should be installed in such a way as to not detract from the beauty or design of DCPC. For planning purposes drainage and irrigation should be included in the master plan; however it is understood that field adjustments in these instances are important.

Once approved and adopted, the green and grounds committee along with the superintendent, are responsible for implementing the master plan within yearly budget constraints. No other architectural changes to the golf course will be permitted unless approved by the green and grounds committee and the board of governors.

The master plan is not meant to take away from the G&G Committee's ability to manage the golf course on a day to day basis. Green speed, rough height and other factors influencing playability will continue under the guidance of the G&G committee.
