

IN ITS NEW HOME.

Norfolk Country Club Has Informal Meeting.

Disagreeable Weather Does Not Stop Large Gathering.

Pleasant and Commodious Quarters for the New Social Organization.

WESTWOOD, Feb 22—In spite of the storm and attendant disagreeable weather the members of the Norfolk country club, the latest organization of the kind in the section, opened their new quarters at Fairview today.
